It is with great sadness we tell of the passing of Arthur to his heavenly reward on 28 February. It was more sudden than expected but he went peacefully in his sleep without pain



and his family were with him to the end. He has been one of our magazine's most respected authors since he first started writing for us fifteen years ago with, 'Amazing Historical Evidence'. The concluding words of the article were,

'Historical precedent begets responsibility and especially in these days when as a nation we have begun to cast away the foundations of the faith first brought to this land in AD 36. We do this at our peril. More than any other nation on earth since the days of the resurrection, we have been privileged to be a Christian nation, with missionary responsibilities, but the fires are going out. We have a great national and personal responsibility based on our history. My main purpose in writing this paper has been to reveal that fact'.

These words show how deep Arthur's knowledge was. Not only did he have a good grasp of the original biblical languages but his scientific qualifications also enabled him to bring God's Word to a wide readership in an acceptable way. He was an extensive author and for decades not only published his weekly *Prophetic Telegraph* dealing with many subjects in the light of scripture but authored more than a dozen books now for sale on Amazon and in other bookshops. Amongst these in 2013 was *Albion Restored* - A Detective Journey to discover the Birth of Christianity in England, a nearly 400 page definitive handbook full of maps, diagrams and pictures. This he gleaned from his extensive tour of western England recording traditions and sayings straight from the lips of elderly folk who still lived there.

He will indeed be sorely missed amongst his several children with whom he readily shared his research into the Christian story. In addition we are all indebted to him for the legacy he leaves us in the form of his written words and his example of steadfast faith in greater heavenly things to come.
